AIR-P Presents: Involving Community Partners in Autism Research

Involving community partners in the design, execution and dissemination of research yields more impactful studies that address the priorities of the communities being studied, and benefits researchers, healthcare providers and target communities. This presentation will review the principles of Community Based Participatory Research (CBPR), discuss its late arrival to the field of autism research highlighting the ongoing contributions of AASPIRE, and review US government support of patient centered research through PCORI funding. This presentation will also illustrate the benefits of collaborating with community partners by presenting a project in which a team of

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researchers and a team of autistic community advocates are co-producing autism research.

Topics will include:

- Community Based Participatory Research (CBPR) benefits community participants, health care providers and researchers alike
- Community partners participate in all aspects of a research study and contribute to the development of culturally appropriate instruments, sensitive recruitment methods.
- Community partners receive compensation for their work and contribute to publications, and public presentations.
- Resulting research reveals a deeper understanding of the uniqueness of the communities studied, and a more accurate framework for testing and adapting healthcare interventions to community needs.

RESEARCH STUDY OPPORTUNITIES

Kennedy Krieger Institute: 'G.I. Wanna Talk About Autism'

Goal: The goal of this study is to better understand the experiences, needs, and priorities of autistic adults with a history of gastrointestinal (GI) symptoms. We will use data to develop recommendations on how to improve the GI health of autistic adults. In this first phase of the study, we are looking to interview 20 autistic adults (18 years and older) with a history of gastrointestinal health symptoms. *This study was co-created with a community board, including autistic adults and other stakeholders. This study is funded by the Autism Intervention Research Network on Physical Health (AIR-P).*

- In the July webinar, Dr. Dora Raymaker provided an overview of systems approaches, concepts, and methodologies that could help lead to long-term change, with real-world examples drawn from within autism employment research and public health. Holistic approaches to inquiry, such as systems thinking and action research, target situations that have high degrees of complexity or heterogeneity. This makes them useful in designing and conducting autism services intervention research where personal and systems-level factors interact in complex ways; for example, in developing employment interventions.
